Optimist International Scholarship Contests

Optimist International Oratorical Contest

2025-2026 Topic: “The Moment I Realized I Belonged — My Definition of Community”

Who: The contest is open to contestants under the age of 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 – September 30) and who have not yet completed secondary school or its equivalent, including CEGEP students in Québec, Canada. There is no minimum age.

Optimist International Essay Contest

Topic for the 2025-2026 school year is: **“How My Acts of Service Help Me Understand What My Community Means to Me”**

Who: The contest is open to contestants under the age of 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 - September 30) and who have not yet completed secondary school or its equivalent, including CEGEP students in Québec, Canada. There is no minimum age. Students must enter in the District in which they reside. U.S. students attending school on military installations outside the U.S. are eligible to enter in their last home of record.

Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH)

Topic for the 2025-2026 school year is: **"The Moment I Realized I Belonged - My Definition of Community"**

Who: The contest is open to young people through grade 12 in the United States and Canada, to CEGEP in Québec and grade 13 in the Caribbean, who are educated in the United States, Canada or the Caribbean. Students must submit the results of an audiogram completed no longer than 24 months prior to the date of the contest by a qualified audiologist. Students must be certified to have an uncorrected hearing loss of 40 decibels or more, which must be supported by the audiogram in order to be eligible to compete. Students with permanent correction should compete in the Optimist International Oratorical contest.

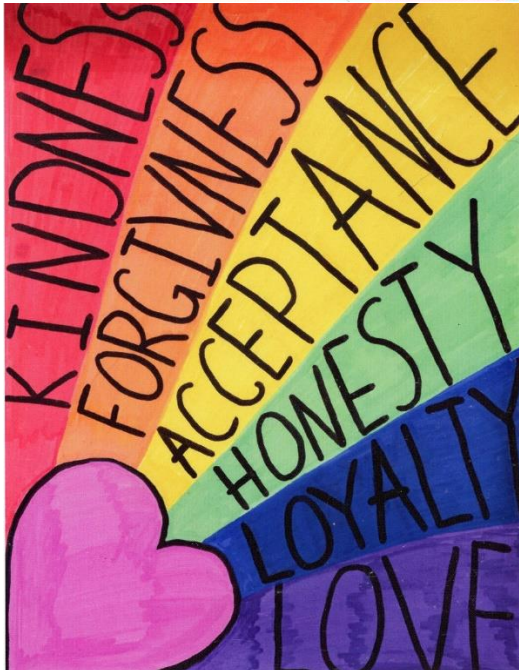

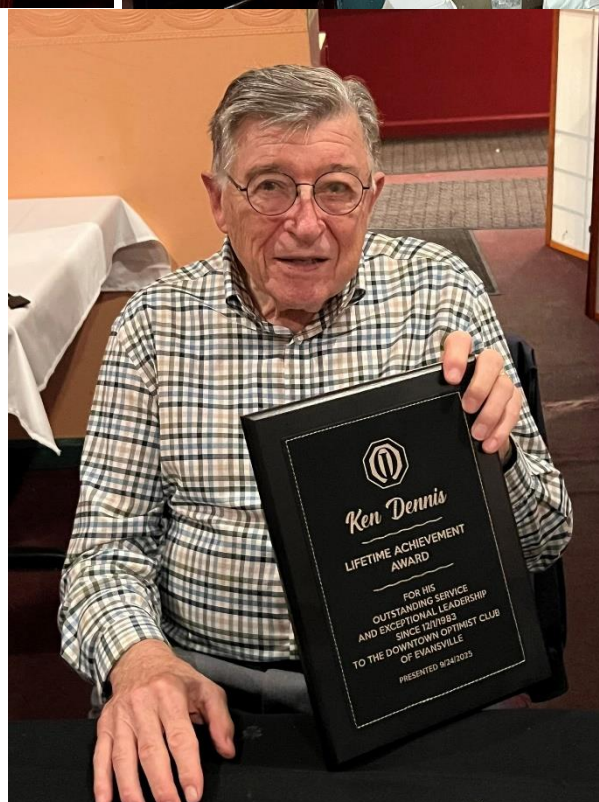

Clay County Optimist Club

Concludes Annual Clothe A Child Drive

On August 5th, the members of the Clay County Optimist Club conducted the distribution of clothing for the annual Clothe A Child Drive. After months of fundraising and clothing purchases, the members had divided up the clothing for each child into personalized clothing baskets and set them up in the shelter at the NE corner of Forest Park. The distribution on Tuesday, August 5th coincided with the National Night Out events being conducted at the Pavilion.

The fundraising kicked off in March and continued through June. Members of the club, friends of Optimism, many businesses, local organizations and some foundations all came together to help the Optimist Club meet its \$14,500 fundraising goal.

The plan is to provide clothing for about 100 Clay Community School Children plus an estimated 45 children that DCS will remove from their homes on an emergency basis. In 2025, The Clay County Optimist Club received a \$4,500 grant from the Wabash Valley Community Foundation to provide funding for the initial year of the DCS Clothe A Child effort. In future years, this funding will need to come from the general public donations to maintain the DCS program.

For the school children, the Optimists purchased 2-3 school outfits for each child for distribution at Forest Park. These purchases take place during the spring and summer months as sales occur. Members Monica Wallace, Amber Parkey, Sandy Hendrich and Cheryl Steurwald lead the effort to identify bargains throughout the spring and summer months. They also do most of the work dividing up the clothing for each child to receive. When the big day for the distribution finally arrived, several additional Optimists were present at Forest Park to help organize the clothing baskets and to find them for the families as they arrived to get the clothing. Members Dick Boyce, Mark Parkey, John Tribble, Steve Lamb and Jim Tribble were among those present to help execute the distribution of clothing.

In parallel to the Clothe A Child program, the Clay County Optimists also conduct two other efforts to provide necessities for the children of Clay County. During July and August, the members work with area churches and individuals to collect for the Health & Hygiene Drive. Various area churches collect donations from the congregations consisting of soap, tooth paste, combs and brushes, deodorant and other daily necessities. These are divided up into packets for the 10-public school nurses to use when emergencies arise. It is still possible to make a donation of goods to the Health & Hygiene Drive by dropping off items at the Hamilton Center Office on the east side of Brazil on National Avenue.

In September, the Optimists and local churches conduct an “Undie Sunday” collection for the school children who need emergency under clothes at school. Again, donations can be made at any time at the Hamilton Center Office on the east side of Brazil.

OI Foundation

Dime-A-Day Level is reached by a contribution of \$36.50 to the Foundation within one Optimist Year and is recognized by the presentation of a pin.

The Diamond Level requires a minimum donation to the Foundation of \$100 annually and the donor receives a specially designed postcard and thank you message from the Foundation President.



Women's Philanthropy Council (WPC) was formed in 2005 to support the work of the Optimist International Foundation. Members reach out to women as donors and assist in shaping their philanthropy. All donations raised through the giving circle of the WPC will be used to underwrite World Oratorical Championship scholarships for young women that win the Regional Contest from the US and in the Caribbean. It is important to note that your contribution to OIF designated to support the efforts of the WPC will be counted as a restricted

donation and will not be credited to your annual giving or that of your District/Club. It will count towards lifetime giving.

Members will be invited to attend a recognition dinner with the Foundations' Boards of Directors at the International Convention. Members also receive a ribbon noting their Membership in Society to be worn with Convention badge.

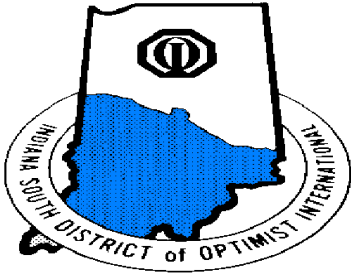
